2045 Master Plan Overview

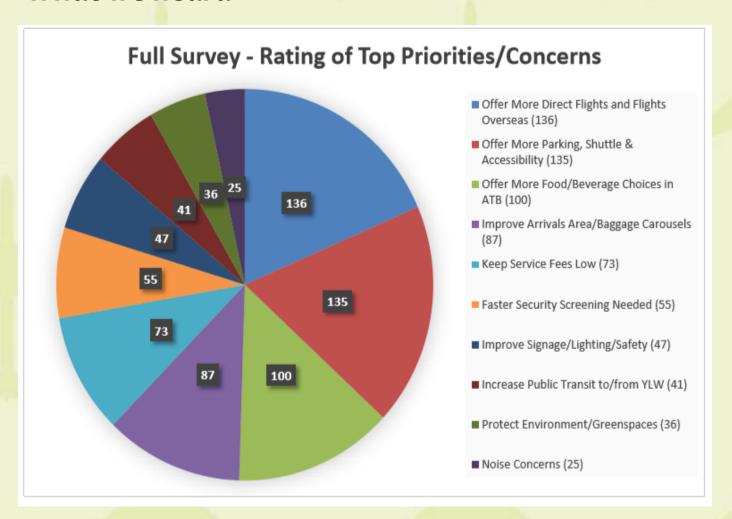
Key Findings

- Current runway capacity and length are sufficient to meet future demand
- YLW generates significant economic impacts - over 1400 jobs and a GDP of \$152 million
- Apron will require five new remote aircraft parking stands by 2035 and 1 new terminal gate stand by 2045
- Passenger traffic is forecast to increase from 1.6 to 3.6 million passengers by 2045
- Air terminal building will require expanded hold rooms and baggage claim areas

- Aircraft movements are forecast to increase by approximately 50% most of this increase will come from air carriers
- Current roadways and parking facilities require reconfiguration and expansion
- Current Official Community Plan (OCP) zoning should be preserved
- More commercial land (on airport) is needed
- New aerodrome regulations will impact planning
- Additional land (off airport) will need to be acquired

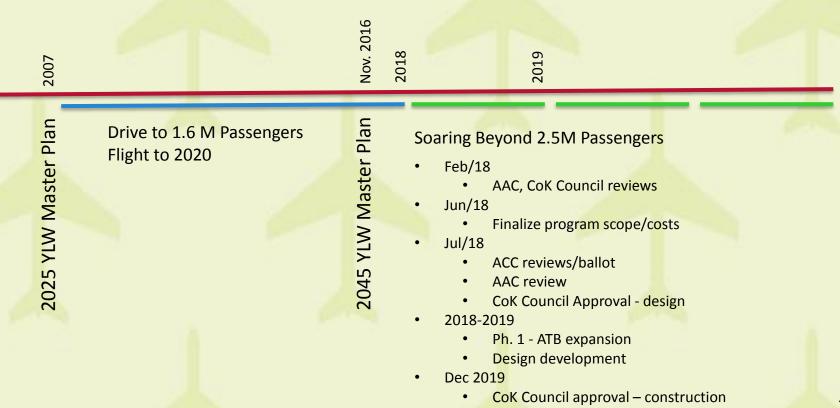

STAKEHOLDER FEEDBACK What we have learned so far



- 1 Location at oversize baggage and current arrivals area is congested when volume of passengers is high.
- Better signage and wayfinding to direct passengers to security and washrooms
- 3 Storage and office space will be required in the future, but specific amounts could not be confirmed at this time.
- 4 Current podium layout in hold room is highly congested, noisy and causes confusion for passengers
- More direct relationship to podium and gate is desired with increased view to airside
- 6 More storage space for wheelchairs at gates is needed
- Passengers have trouble navigating the airside corridor and often get lost, board the wrong plane, and leave secure area accidentally

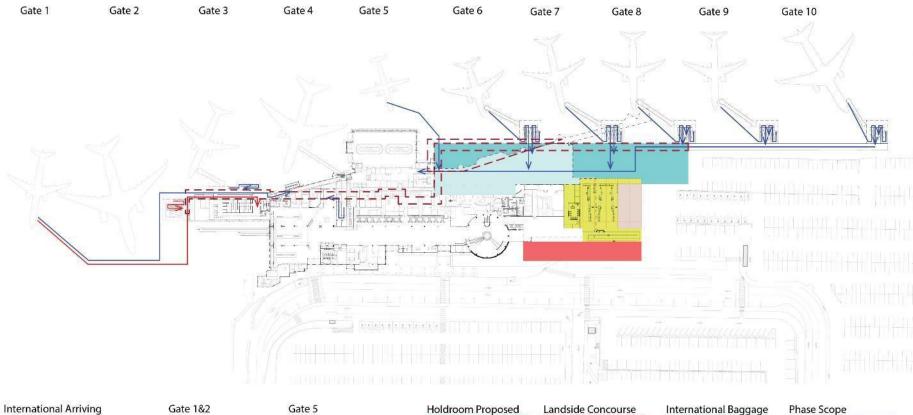








ATB - PHASE 2 Main Floor Plan

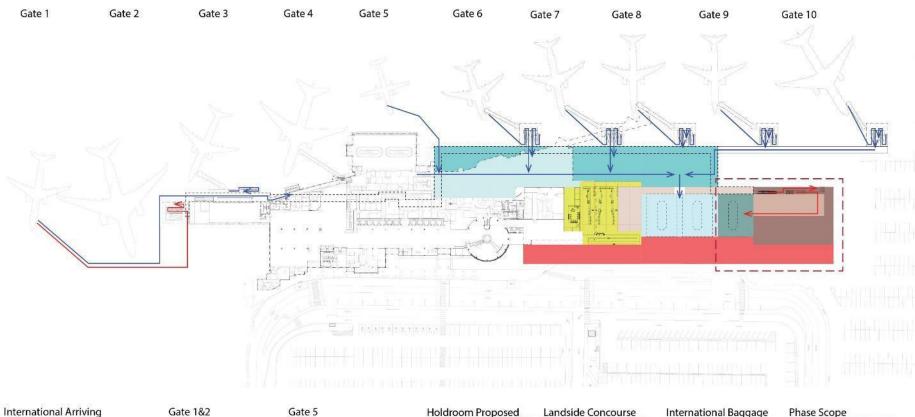

Recommendation:

THAT Council receives for information, the report from the Sport & Event Services Manager dated February 5, 2018, with respect to assembling a Nominations Committee to recruit community volunteers to serve as Directors for the Kelowna 2019 55+ BC Games;

AND THAT Council appoint the Mayor to chair the Nominations Committee.

Purpose:

To advise Council on the nomination process for the Kelowna 2019 55+ BC Games Board of Directors and have Council appoint the Mayor to chair the Nominations Committee.

Background:

The 55+ BC Games, formerly known as the BC Seniors Games, is a multi-sport event held annually in BC that brings together approximately 3,800 athletes each year to celebrate community and athletic achievement. The BC Seniors Games Society is the parent organization that is responsible for the overall governance of the Games, the sport specific rules, and the liaison with the participants. Its mission is to improve the health, lifestyle, and image of British Columbia's 55+ population.

In September 2015, Kelowna was selected to host the 2019 55+ BC Games and the time has now come to initiate the preparations for those Games. City staff recently met with members of the BC Senior Games Society to review the Games timeline and discuss the planning process. One of the first steps in this process is assembling a Nominations Committee to recommend and recruit a list of candidates who will serve on the Board of Directors for the new Society that will be formed, and be responsible for organizing and hosting the Games.

Based on preliminary discussions with the BC Senior Games Society, it is recommended that the Mayor chair the Nominations Committee, which will be assembled through an internal selection process and consist of the following representation:

- Jim Gabriel Divisional Director, Active Living & Culture City of Kelowna
- Doug Nicholas Sport & Event Services Manager City of Kelowna
- Sport Representative
- Arts & Culture Representative
- Business Representative

The first order of business for the Nominations Committee will be to recruit a President for the Games. Once identified, the President would join the Nominations Committee and assist with the recruitment of volunteers who will serve as the Directors for the Games. The Directors' roles and responsibilities, and all related details, are well laid out by the BC Senior Games Society with a total of twelve (12) portfolios needing to be filled.

It is anticipated that the Nominations Committee will need to meet 2 or 3 times throughout the process and be required to monitor and report progress. Ideally, the nomination process will be complete by the end of February at which time a list of recommended names will be brought forward to Council for endorsement, and an update on the overall planning process and Games timeline will be provided.
