




- Multiple Council touch points




#### **2040 Transportation Master Plan**




- ▶ Transportation Master Plan


- ► Guide decision making and plan reviews


### 2023 Key Themes - OCP


- Kelowna is becoming a much more urban city particularly in Downtown, Pandosy and Rutland
- ▶ Some Urban Centres, such as Pandosy and Midtown are already approaching or even surpassing their 2040 growth targets
- Missing middle housing saw a substantial change in residential growth by building subtypes in 2023
- ► Office vacancy is stable but will be monitoring as new buildings are completed
- Industrial vacancy rose but is still very low
- ▶ Policies in the OCP continued to support the preservation of agricultural lands.



### A More Urban City









- Rapid growth in nearly all Urban Centres
- Pandosy will surpass the 2040 targets
- Rutland surpassed Midtown with steady growth
- Some Urban Centres growing very quickly, others more modestly
- Urban Centre Framework will provide further refinement of targets





### **More Housing Variety**





- Ground-oriented missing middle saw the largest change in residential growth
- Infill Options Program and Housing Accelerator Fund will signal next steps in housing





# **Protection of Agriculture**

- No ALR exclusions
- No agricultural properties rezoned
- 29.9% of all land in the city was being actively farmed, slightly higher than 29.8% in 2021-2022

# 2023 Key Themes - TMP

- ► Transit ridership has recovered from the pandemic. Our busiest routes serve the Core Area and Urban Centres.
- ▶ Vehicle travel times were relatively stable between 2022 and 2023, despite population growth of 5 per cent.
- The number of traffic collisions leading to injury or fatality is decreasing.
- ► Trips by bike are stable and distance ridden is increasing
- ▶ Shared micromobility ridership more than doubled in 2023

Annual boardings for Kelowna Regional Transit System (in millions)




#### Afternoon peak travel times

### Collisions resulting in injuries




Annual number of collision resulting in at least one injury in Kelowna




Annual collisions at Clement Ave and Clifton Rd


